The Brewster High School football team found themselves in a hole too deep to dig out of Friday night and ended up with a 52-20 loss to the visiting Weskan Coyotes.

The Bulldogs first possession found them punting from their own 22 after three plays. The south wind caught the high kick, giving it plenty of hang time, but little distance and Weskan took over on the Brewster 38.

The Coyotes relied on quickness and a good running attack to carry them to the 12, where misdirection put Landon Funk in the open to receive a Nolan Cox bullet and draw first blood.

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
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
