

Harold Winston, 78, a rural mail carrier and farmer from St. Francis, died Sunday, Sept. 27, 2002, at the Cheyenne County Hospital.

obituary

He was born Oct. 22, 1923, in Parks, Neb., the third son of Daniel Morgan and Ruby Elverda Winston. He moved with his family to a farm in northwest Cheyenne County when he was a small

He spent his early years herding cattle and raising crops, working from daylight to dark. He and his brother Burman were daredevils in and out of the saddle, producing many stories to retell throughout his life. On Sept. 23, 1944, he married Bettye

Wiggins in Goodland before being shipped overseas to serve in World War II. He was in the 18th Armored Battalion and fought in General George Patton's Third Army and the First and Ninth Armies in France, Luxemborg, Belgium and Germany. He was wounded in action April 9,

1944, and returned home with several medals and many more stories. Harold and Bettye lived in St. Francis for the rest of their lives. He was a rural mail carrier, farmer and school bus driver before retiring in

1981. He spent many hours at the Riv-

erside Golf Course and at the bowling

alley with his family and friends. In 1999, Harold and Bettye moved from their home of 44 years to a smaller retirement home. His health declined due to chronic emphysema.

Survivors include his wife: two sons. Kevin (Barbara) Winston of Goodland Arrow, Okla.: two daughters, Kimberley (Ron) Schields of Goodland and Shana Williams of Chattanooga, Tenn.; and a sister, Wilma (Carl) Hendricks of St. Francis.
