Award-winning artist shows art in Goodland

An award-winning artist, whose work is displayed across the country and abroad, is bringing her art to Goodland and will be welcomed at a reception from 1-3 p.m. Sunday at the Carnegie Arts Center. Linda Crawford of Cascade, Colo., will display her art at the center until Thursday, Oct. 31.

Crawford lived in Saudi Arabia for a time with her family and found many unusual subjects for her work there. She has a studio in Cascade which is open by appointment and uses the variety of landscapes in Colorado, especially scenes of the Pike's Peak region, in her work.

Her watercolors hang in collections across the United States, Saudi Arabia and Europe. Saudi Prince Abdula has

Crawford's work in his collection, and her work is featured in galleries in Telluride, Aspen and Vail, Colo.

She won an award from the Kansas Watercolor Society, a first place at the National Small Painting Exhibition in Albuquerque, N.M., a first place at the Black Forest International Art Exhibition in Colorado and Best of Show at the Colorado Springs Art Exhibition.

Crawford is originally from Wichita and pursued her education at the National Academy of Design in New York City and studied under Mario Cooper, president of the American Watercolor Society, and Joseph Hirsh, renowned graphic artist.

Members of the Oakley Range Riders saddle club competed in the show. For some of the riders it was their first state competition and for others it was one of many.

However, it was the first time that Oakley Range Riders came home with the Junior and Senior Queen titles. The titles were won by cousins, Lisa and Danielle Jones, both of Colby. Lisa also won all-around second runner up in the 14-17 division.

Parents/child care providers need to be aware of syndrome

October is Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) Awareness Month. It is important for parents and child care providers to familiarize themselves with information about the syndrome.

The syndrome, commonly known as "Cot Death," was originally defined in 1969. It is the name given to the sudden death of an infant or child which is unexpected by history and in which an examination fails to demonstrate cause of death.

The risk of SIDS has been at least halved in many countries by changing some child care practices. It is still not possible to identify which babies are at risk, and the syndrome can occur even when all the known factors have been reduced.

Although SIDS is most common between the ages of two and four months, it can happen to younger and older infants. It can happen to children over 12 months, although this is rare. It occurs in both breast-fed and bottle-fed babies, and of those who die, approximately 60 percent are boys and 40 percent are girls.

Infants have died from SIDS at all times of the day and night, in cots, prams, car seats, bassinets, even in parent's arms. Initially, if a baby died suddenly and in a bed shared with adults, it was thought to be due to an adult rolling on to the infant during sleep.

This was called "over laying." Later, it was suggested that babies may have choked on something, or that death was caused by parental neglect. It is now clear that in most cases none of these explanations was correct — and the babies were, in all probability, the victims of what is now known as SIDS.

While it is not known what causes SIDS, it is known that it is not contagious. Parents' immediate reactions to their baby's death may be shock, de-

nial, disbelief, or a sense of numbness or unreality. Some of the most common emotions felt include guilt, anger, fear, blame and despair.

Prolonged feelings of guilt can be destructive. Because the causes of SIDS are unknown, parents will often seek their own explanations for the tragedy and may blame themselves. It is important that parents and other caregivers are reassured that SIDS is nobody's fault.

Based on latest research the following are precautions to take to reduce the risk of SIDS:

- Place your baby on his back to sleep at night and nap time.
- Use a firm mattress in a safety-approved crib.
- Eliminate the fluffy, loose bedding from your baby's sleep area.
- Keep your baby's face clear of coverings.

- Be careful not to overheat your baby.
- Don't allow anyone to smoke around your baby.
- Educate baby-sitters, day care providers, grandparents and everyone who cares for your baby about SIDS risks.

Recent research shows a disproportionate one-fifth of all SIDS occurring in day care. The risk of SIDS is double for African-American babies as opposed to white babies and two and one half greater for Native Americans — largely contributing to overall higher rates of infant mortality in these populations.

Materials have been developed to help child care providers and health professionals answer questions such as "Will babies choke on spit-up if they sleep on their backs?"
