The Goodland Daily News The fact they were playing on another school's field and it was the other team's homecoming game didn't stop the Goodland Cowboys from slaughtering the Oakley Plainsmen 56-12 in Oakley on Friday night.

The Cowboys, who didn't win a game all last year, fought hard for the victory, scoring a touchdown almost every time they got their hands on the ball — except when they let the clock run out at the end of the first half and when the final buzzer ended their last drive.

The Plainsmen helped a little, making several mistakes that stopped them from scoring points and led to Goodland touchdowns. Oakley failed twice on two-point conversion attempts, received a few false-start penalties that hindered their drive and fumbled twice in the second half.

Coach Tony Diehl said Oakley made mistakes because the Cowboys were putting a lot of pressure on the Plainsmen. He attributed the big win to the fact Goodland's offense dominated Oakley all night and that the Cowboy defense consistently hit hard.

The Plainsmen, however, can claim one of the most exciting plays of the night.

With the Cowboys up by 16 about halfway through the second quarter, Plainsman John Racette managed to outmaneuver Goodland's defense, running an 81-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. Missing the two-point conversion, Oakley got within 10 points of Goodland, 22-12, but never came any closer, failing to score again during the game.

The Cowboys did their part to make t an action-packed night.

Playing with a well-padded cast on his right arm, Jordan Bedore gained a total of 174 yards, mostly by running up the middle, and scored three touchdowns. Freshman Bobby Miller gained a total of 211 yards, making several long runs, and scoring one touchdown.

The Oakley game started with the Plainsmen winning the coin toss but deferring to the Cowboys, who chose to receive.

Goodland quickly scored its first touchdown and Oakley answered with one of its own. Miller stopped Plainsman Bobby Dennis from scoring on the two-point conversion, bringing the score to 7-6.

On a third down with six yards to go, it looked as if the Cowboys might have to turn the ball over, but the Plainsmen received an offsides penalty, moving the Cowboys to a first down and eventually another touchdown.

The Cowboys stopped the Plainsmen from scoring early in the second quarter, and quarterback Jared Doke then ran 9 yards for the first of two touchdowns he made.

Before the extra-point kick, Oakley received a penalty for being offsides and the Cowboys decided to go for the two-point conversion. They were successful, bringing the score to 22-6.

Oakley didn't waste any time trying to close the score gap, with Racette running his 81-yard kickoff return into the end zone, bringing the Oakley fans to their feet and the score to 22-12.

The Cowboys didn't let it get them down, answering with a 21-yard return by Malcolm White, several long runs and a quick touchdown by Bedore. Goodland lost the extra point when the football hit the crossbar, but went into the second half with a 16-point lead.

The Plainsmen got the first possession in the second half, but only gained 5 yards after recovering the kickoff on their own 41-yard line, forcing them to punt.

Goodland lost possession after receiving a 15-yard penalty for roughing the kicker, but got it back when Cowboy Tom Cotter recovered an Oakley fumble at the 37-yard line. The Cowboys drove for a touchdown, boosting the score to 35-12.

Oakley couldn't handle heavy pressure from the Cowboys and spent the rest of the third and fourth quarters making small advances and trying to compensate for mistakes.

The Cowboys headed into the fourth quarter with a 30-point lead over the Plainsmen and kept driving forward, making two more touchdowns for a final score of 56-12.
