Verdi's *Il Travatore* will be on Friday, Jan. 31, and Puccini's *Tosca* will be Saturday, Feb. 1. Tickets for these performances will be on sale starting at 9 a.m. Saturday.

Ticket prices for Domingo are \$30, \$50, \$100, \$150, \$200 and \$300. Following the concert, there will be a Gala Black-Tie Dinner Dance with Domingo as the guest of honor. Tickets for the dinner dance will be sold for \$600 (\$300 tax deductible) and only in conjunction with premier concert tickets. Tickets for the operas are \$18, \$28, \$45 and \$100 (\$40 tax deductible). Student tickets are \$12.

Il Travatore is a four-act opera set in Spain at the beginning of the 15th century, expressing love, deceit, envy, intrigue and honor in human behavior.

Tosca is a three-act opera set in Rome in 1800 and is the story of doubt, suspicion and cheating with history, politics and ideals in the background and sometimes as the pretext for real motivations.

The operas will be performed by the Wichita Grand Opera in cooperation with the Russian State Opera.
