City gives community foundation nearly \$700

The Goodland City Commission decided on Monday to join the county and school district in giving the recently-formed Sherman County Community Foundation \$692.21.

Schlyer Goodwin, the foundation's director, had asked the commission for the money at a previous meeting, along with the school board, Sherman County Commission and three Goodland banks to help get the organization off the ground.

The commissioners said they would approve it if the other two government groups did. The school board approved giving the foundation the money last month, and the county indicated it would also.

Goodwin, who called before the meeting to say he wouldn't make it because he was sick, had asked that the money from the different groups be channeled through the city. The foundation did not yet have non-profit status, Goodwin said, and there might have been problems with the banks being able to claim tax deductions.

City Manager Ron Pickman said the city's lawyers did not approve the plan, and the foundation is now in the process of becoming a non-profit corporation.

Commissioner Dean Blume said he thought the foundation was a good idea, but wished the foundation had come up with another way of raising money.

"City taxpayers are paying that money three times," he said, "with the city, the county and the school board. I'm not against the foundation, but I'm

not sure about its method of collection."

Blume said the group could have tried to raise money through businesses and individuals instead of asking for tax money.

"I have a problem with always going to the taxpayers to get money," he said.

Commissioner Curtis Hurd said he agreed with Blume to a point, but said once the foundation gets off the ground, it will help take the burden off taxpayers.

"Some of the things this foundation will do are things we spend tax dollars on now," he said.

Lutters said he felt the same way as Hurd.

"I agree with you some, Dean," Lutters said, "but I think if someone is doing something like this we should be positive, not negative."

The decision to give the money to the foundation was unanimous.

In other business, the commission: • Declared Friday through Sunday as "Helping People with Mental Retardation Days," at the request of the Goodland Knights of Columbus."

• Passed a zoning ordinance allowing household hazardous waste collection in commercial and industrial zones. The code did not specifically allow this type of collection, and needed to be amended to allow Sherman County to take in the waste at 1820 Cherry.

• Heard from Royal Reid and Dave Daniels of the Sherman County Economic Development Council that a

director had been hired and would start work at the beginning of November.

• Heard an update from Mayor Tom Rohr, a member of the Sherman County grant writer committee. He said Director Penny Nemecek has submitted two grant proposals, and two others were almost done. He said if the commissioners had any new projects for her to work on, to prioritize them and give them to Pickman.

• Passed a resolution supporting a regional strategic plan and asking that the city be reapposed as an enterprise zone by the Kansas Department of Commerce and Housing. This is something done periodically, Pickman said, to keep all the paperwork in order.

• Learned about a program by Northwest Kansas Housing which helps homeowners with emergency repairs if the household income is less than 60 percent of the area median income.

• Learned about a League of Kansas Municipalities regional supper Thursday, Nov. 14, in WaKeeney, and a Municipal Leadership Academy class on planning and zoning Friday, Nov. 8, in Colby.

agreement to pay half of the cost up front, and to reimburse the person after they had completed the class and received their state certification. The agreement calls for two years service to the ambulance service and the hospital for the county support.

Krall said he mistakenly told three of the people that the county would pay all of the costs up front.

The total cost per person for the class is \$800, and Krall said the cost had gone up from the college to \$45 per credit hour and the class was now 12 credit hours. There is a cost of \$110 for the testing and the remainder is for books and supplies.

Frankenfeld said he felt the county should stick with the program they have approved to pay the half up front and the other after completion.

"I don't think the others understood the process for applying," Gleason said.

Tiede asked if the Hospital Founda-

tion couldn't help with the other half of the funding needs for the ones in this class, and when they have completed the program the county will pay the foundation back.

Jolly said the foundation was running very slim on money at this time, but agreed to ask. Gleason and Krall agreed that they would ask the foundation about helping with the three or four

who may need the \$400 up front to be in the class, and they will have those who are expecting county assistance fill out the paperwork and get it on the agenda for the next meeting.

The next commission meeting will be 8 a.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 15. To get items on the agenda they need to be submitted to the county clerk by noon on Thursday.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING 5 OF THE USE REGULATIONS OF THE ZONING CODE OF THE CITY OF GOODLAND, KANSAS. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF CITY OF GOODLAND, KANSAS:

SECTION 1. Section X of Article 5 is amended to read as follows: Solid Waste Collection/Processing Facilities and Household Hazardous Water Collection

SECTION 2. The following standards shall apply to Solid Waste Collection/Processing sing facilities and Household Hazardous Waste Collection. Use table under manufacturing industrial and extractive uses shall be amended by adding the following language: Household hazardous waste collection, P under zoning districts non-residential C-1, P under zoning districts nonresidential 1- 1, P under zoning districts non-residential 1-2, and X under use Standards.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in force and take effect after its publication in the official City's newspaper
