## Jim W. Hesse

Jimmy William Hesse, 84, a carpenter and farmer from Wray, Colo., formerly from Goodland, died Sunday, Oct. 13, 2002, at Memorial Hospital in Colorado Springs, where he had been a patient for two days. He had been battling cancer for the last 10 years.

He was born Sept. 18, 1918, in Wray, the son of Henry and Bertha (Jones) Hesse and grew up on the family farm west of Wray. He attended and graduated from school in Wray.

On April 17, 1938, he married Dorothy Darlene Colby in Wray. Mr. Hesse did carpentry work while in Wray and was a farmer. Dorothy died in 1964.

In January 1969 he married Velma White in Goodland. He and Velma moved to Goodland in 1972, and he continued doing carpentry work here until he retired in 1982. Velma died in 1983.

On July 28, 1985, he married O'Linda McClung in Goodland. He was a board member at the Goodland Senior Center. He enjoyed playing pool at the center, bowling, woodworking and traveling.

Also preceding him in death were his parents, a step-granddaughter and a sister, Lena Losey.

Survivors include his wife, O'Linda; three daughters, Mary Lou (Kenneth) Rose of Wray, Mona Lee (Clifford) Odell of Colorado Springs and Connie Sue (Joel) Bienhoff of Kensington; a step-son, Larry (Carolyn) White of Goodland; three step-daughters, Shirley (Alvin) Amack of St. Francis, Shirley (Roland) Barnes of Denver and Janice (Larry) Pounds of Yuma, Colo.; a brother, Leo (Joy) Hesse of Green Valley, Ariz.; 14 grandchildren; and 19 great-grandchildren.

Services will be at 10 a.m. Friday, Oct. 18, 2002, at Bateman Funeral Home in Goodland with the burial at 2 p.m. in the Grandview Cemetery in Wray. Pastor Scott Grimshaw will be officiating.
