

Cowboys, Eagles even match

The Goodland Cowboys will face their rivals the Colby Eagles on Friday for their second district game of the season.

The game will start at 6:30 p.m. Mountain Time at the Colby Stadium. Other teams included in Goodland's district are Ulysses and Scott City, which will also face off on Friday. Goodland and Scott City are at the top of their district after the first round of district play last week. The Cowboys beat Ulysses 40-7 and Scott City beat the Eagles 57-21. Cowboy Coach Tony Diehl said if the Cowboys beat Colby and Scott City defeats Ulysses, Goodland will be guaranteed a playoff spot this year. If Goodland or Scott loses, he said, district play will likely end with a three-way tie and the two teams with the highest winning points will advance. Diehl said it could also be decided by a coin toss.

Diehl said several factors will create an exciting game on Friday. The Cowboys and Eagles, old rivals, are matched well, he said, noting that game scores show that. Goodland and Colby both lost to Atwood and Hoxie during the regular season, he said, and beat Holcomb. Atwood beat the Cowboys 35-19 and Colby 33-14, Hoxie defeated Goodland 26-14 and Colby 28-20 and Holcomb fell to Goodland 39-0 and Colby 41-20. "I think we're up against a pretty equal team," Diehl said. The 2-5 Eagles have one of the best offenses the 4-3 Cowboys have faced this year, the coach said. He said one of the smartest things Goodland can do during the game is keep Colby's offense off the field. "The key to our defense is going to be our offense," he said. The Cowboys will have to play a mistake-free ball handling game on the offense, he said. And the defensive

players will have to stay aggressive and not let themselves get shaken up by a big play. "Our defense will have to keep our poise under all conditions," he said. The conditions could be cold and wet, Diehl said. He said he hopes that's the case, because poor field conditions favor a running game. He said Goodland statistically has the second best running game next to Hoxie. The Cowboys have the No. 1 pass defense statistically, he said. Diehl said he'll be surprised if Scott City doesn't win this week. "Scott City is very, very strong this year," he said. But the coach said he thinks the Cowboys have a good chance at bringing down Scott City in the final round of district play next Thursday. "In any scenario," he said, we have a chance to beat them and we will play like we're going to win."

Kansas expected to repeat as Big 12 basketball champion

DALLAS (AP) — Kansas, which returns three starters from last year's Final Four basketball team, is favored to repeat as Big 12 champion, according to the conference preseason coaches poll released Wednesday.

The Jayhawks received seven first-place votes and were followed in the poll by Oklahoma, which also made the Final Four last year. The Sooners got three first-place votes. Texas was third and received the other two first-place votes.

UT was followed, in order, by Missouri, Texas Tech and Oklahoma State, Iowa State, Baylor, Colorado, Nebraska, Kansas State and Texas A&M. Oklahoma senior Hollis Price is the coaches' preseason Big 12 player of the year. Price was the most outstanding

player of the Big 12 tournament and the NCAA West Regional.

Other players receiving votes were Nick Collison and Kirk Hinrich of Kansas, and T.J. Ford of Texas. Price, Hinrich, Collison, Ford, and Texas Tech guard Andre Emmett were the coaches' preseason All-Big 12 team selections.

Preseason newcomer of the year honors went to Nebraska guard Nate Johnson, who was the JUCO Division II national player last season at Penn Valley Community College in Kansas City. He averaged 26.5 points per game.

Forward/guard Antoine Wright was the coaches' preseason freshman of the year. Wright averaged 26.5 points and 11 rebounds last year at Lawrence Academy in Groton, Mass.

Jayhawks face Tigers Saturday

LAWRENCE (AP) — Kansas quarterback Bill Whittemore and Missouri quarterback Brad Smith will play a "whatever you can do I can do better" game Saturday. The rivalry between Kansas (6-2 overall, 0-4 Big 12) and Missouri (3-4, 0-3) is the longest west of the Mississippi and the second-longest in the nation behind only Minnesota and Wisconsin. The 11th game will take place in Columbia, with Kansas leading the series 51-50-9.

Whittemore and Smith are both explosive quarterbacks who can pass and throw. Whittemore has thrown for 1,424 yards and nine touchdowns. The Fort Scott Community College transfer has also run for 522 yards and 11 touchdowns. His 20 touchdowns ties the Kansas record set by Chip Hilleary for touchdowns responsible for.

Smith has passed for 1,451 yards and eight touchdowns and set a Missouri freshman record with 641 yards rushing. Smith had his best output with 391 yards of total offense against No. 2 Oklahoma.

"I don't know much about him. I know he is a great athlete," said Whittemore. "I watched him play

against Oklahoma and for him to come home and withstand them and fight to the very end says a lot about him."
