Kenyan president dissolves parliament, officially starting campaign

NAIROBI, Kenya—Kenyan President Daniel Moi dissolved parliament today, officially starting the campaign for one of the East African country's most competitive general elections and closing his tenure as one of Africa's longest ruling leaders.

The announcement was broadcast this morning by the state-run Kenya Broadcasting Corp. and later confirmed by members of parliament. A general election must be held within 90 days, although no date has been an-

The election will be the third since the return of multiparty politics in

"Now people will be going to the field. We'll be campaigning everywhere," said Foreign Affairs Minister Marsden Madoka, a ruling party

Kenya's elections come as the nation of 30 million faces its worst economic crisis since independence from Britain in 1963. Critics blame government corruption and mismanagement for the ailing economy, the largest in East Af-

Moi, 78, is only Kenya's second president and has ruled for 24 years. He came to power when Jomo Kenyatta

WASHINGTON — After the Bush administration announced that a \$159 billion federal deficit has ended four straight years of surpluses, both parties immediately tried using the news to their advantage.




