Sometimes addiction is evident in behavior

It is possible that we could figure out that someone has an addiction by their behavior, however, we may not see the effects of this addiction.

What are the effects of intoxication from sedatives? There are always behavioral differences, and there are inappropriate sexual or aggressive behavior, mood changes, impaired judgment, impaired dysfunctional social behavior that occurs shortly after the sedative usage.

We may see one or more of the following signs: slurred speech, uncoordination, unsteady gait, impairment in attention or memory, stupor or even coma in severe cases and an inability to perform or cope with daily living.

What are the effects of withdrawal from alcohol? It usually develops after the cessation of or reduction in heavy and prolonged use of alcohol.

The syndrome includes two or more of the following symptoms: automatic hyperactivity; sweating or pulse greater than 100; increased hand tremor; insomnia; nausea or vomiting; transient visual, tactile or auditory hallucinations or illusions anxiety; and
