Frances Louise Vincent, 88, a rancher's wife from Wallace County, died Thursday, Nov. 7, 2002, at the Greeley County Hospital in Tribune.

She was born Nov. 14, 1913, in Wyandotte County near Kansas City, Kan., the daughter of Mary Numa (Wells) and Anthony Francis "Frank" Goebel.

She attended grade school in Kansas City, high school at St. Mary's Academy and college at Ursuline Academy in Paola.

In 1932, she moved with her family to rural Winona. She married neighbor Vernon E. Vincent on June 27, 1936. She cooked and helped with music in the rural school north of Wallace.

Officers join forces to make 'Kansas click'

Law enforcement agencies across Kansas will step up efforts to enforce seatbelt and child safety seat laws from Nov. 19 to Dec. 2 for the Thanksgiving holiday.

The Kansas Highway Patrol and 175 local law enforcement agencies, including the Goodland Police Department, the Cheyenne County Sheriff's Department, the Greeley County Sheriff's Department and other police departments, sheriff's departments and campus police at several colleges and universities have joined forces for the Kansas Clicks Special Traffic Enforcement Program.

The program is sponsored by the Kansas Department of Transportation to increase patrols to enhance enforcement of the safety belt laws and to increase public awareness of the need for safety.

The goal of the program is to increase the number of people who wear seat belts in order to prevent injuries and fatalities in traffic accidents.

Along with occupant protection enforcement, agencies will target drunk drivers with sobriety checkpoints and saturation patrol efforts.

Medical documentary to air on public television

The University of Kansas School of Medicine is releasing an award-winning film this month called "Medicine on the Kansas Prairie," which will air on television stations across Kansas at 9 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 26.

The documentary, commemorating the Kansas Rural Preceptor Program, will air on Smoky Hills Public Television, KPTS in Wichita and KTWU in Topeka.

The preceptor program is a teaching tool created in 1951 to expose medical students to the challenges and rewards of practicing medicine in a non-urban environment and is used as a model in medical institutions across the country.

In the program, each fourth-year student spends one month with a volunteer physician, or preceptor, in rural Kansas. As the students watch and assist their physician-mentors, they learn important doctor-patient relationships and community service. The documentary tells the sometimes funny, sometimes touching, stories of these experiences.

The half-hour film will be followed by a 30-minute panel discussion between Kansas health care administrators. The panel will discuss the challenges of rural health care in Kansas and includes State Representative Jerry Moran, Dr. Robert Moser of Tribune and Dr. Mary Beth Miller of St. Francis.

Dr. Barbara Atkinson, University of Kansas school of Medicine executive dean and vice chancellor for clinical affairs and Dr. Edwards Dismuke, dean of the university's medical school in Wichita will also be on the panel.

The film won the documentary division of the KAN Film Festival in June. A companion coffee table book is slated for release in December. The book features photographs of Kansas landscapes and stories told by some of the hundreds of physicians and students who have been touched by the preceptor program.

Friedrichs has taught 27 years in Goodland and taught one year at Arriba, Colo.

"I've had some really good kids in the last few years," he said. "It is an

honor to have them recognize me."

Raymer was unaware that he had even been nominated but said it was nice that a student thought of him.

"I'm honored that someone would think of me," he said.
