Maurice Witten

Maurice H. Witten, 70, of Hays, father of Brenda (Max) Linin of Goodland and former chair of the physics department at Fort Hays State Univeristy, died Saturday, Nov. 23, 2002, in Denver.

He was born Dec. 5, 1931, in Davies County, Mo., the son of Herbert and Ruey (Helmandollar) Witten. On July 5, 1969, he married Joye Romeiser Archer in Hays.

Mr. Witten served in the Air Force from 1950-53. He received a bachelor's degrees in physics and math from Kansas State Teachers College at Emporia in 1956, a master's degree in physics from the University of Nebraska in 1960 and a doctorate in physics and science education from the University of Iowa in 1967.

He was a professor of physics at Fort on Oct. 8, 1992.

Hays State University from 1960 until his retirement in 1998 and was chair (Judy) Witten of Macomb, Ill.; another of the physics department from 1969 to 1989

Mr. Witten was a member of the Hays First United Methodist Church, Hays. He was a past president of the Hays Lions Club and the Kansas Association of Teachers of Science, and a member of the Fort Hays State Endowment Association board.

He was in the Civil Air Patrol, on the Nov. 30, 2002, at the church with the Hays Airport Advisory Board, the National Science Teachers Association, the American Association of Physics Teachers, the Kansas Academy of Science and the National Council for Aerospace Education. He was a grant reviewer for the National Science Foundation and was on several church committees.
