Oklahoma State's Miles named top coach

STILLWATER, Okla. (AP) — Les Miles guided Oklahoma State through one setback after another this season to get the Cowboys to a bowl game for the first time since 1997.

The media in the Big 12 Conference took notice, choosing Miles as The Associated Press coach of the year

"I know there are a lot of deserving guys and a lot of guys who could make a case for their position," Miles said. "I'm very fortunate to have a great staff and a group of guys who love to play."

Miles received eight votes in the balloting. Gary Barnett of Colorado, who led the Buffaloes to their second straight North Division title, received six votes. Bill Snyder of Kansas State, Mike Leach of Texas Tech and Bob Stoops of Oklahoma also received

The Cowboys had high hopes for this season after winning their final two games of 2001 — including an upset of Oklahoma in Norman. Miles often pointed to that game as an example of what kind of effort it takes to be a consistent winner.

Injuries and an eligibility question concerning a player left the Cowboys with a patchwork offensive line until the week of OSU's opener, and tailback

was a question mark due to injuries.

In the first game, at Louisiana Tech, third-quarter lead and wound up losing "It really hammered us," Miles said.
