In the Academic All-American Team list, Bahe at 130 pounds was tied for eighth with Andrew Adams of Dublin (Ohio) High School at 215.

The top of the list was 275-pound National Seniors champion, Tom Curl of Paulsboro (N.J.) High.

He was followed by Mark Johnson of Glasgow (Mont.) High, the 103pound runnerup; Alex Clemsen of Moberly (Mo.) High, at 189; Matt Delguyd of Mayfield Village (Ohio) at 215; Jamie Rakevich of Elma (Wash.) High at 275; Andy Everson of Mitchell (S.D.) High at 135; Lucas Magnani of South Huntington (N.Y.) St. Anthony's High at 119; David West of Midwest City (Okla.) High at 125; Justin Dyer of Olathe (Kan.) South High at 189; and Tyler turner of Spring Valley (Wis.) High.

Eight other wrestlers who earned All-American status in the national open were named to the squad.

The selection was based on gradepoint average, class rank, test scores, academic honors and wrestling accomplishments. The 100 members of this year's team, chosen from over 300 nominations, include 63 graduating seniors, 25 juniors, eight sophomores and four freshmen, and came from 35 states and the District of Columbia.

They hold an average grade-point average of 3.93; nearly half — 44 hold a 4.0 grade-point average of better, and 12 either graduated or stand first in their class. The leading states in representation were Ohio (8); Georgia and Wisconsin (7); and Michigan, North Carolina and Oregon (5 each).

The 100-man team included a record 51 state champions, with record numbers of multi-time state champions as well; 16 two-time champions, three four-time champions and a five-time champion, Andrew Iannuzzi of Lewisville (N.C.) Forsyth Country Day School. Seventeen ended the season with perfect records.

Bahe Named All-American Bahe, a Goodland High School se-

nior, earned the title of "All-American" in April by placing eighth in his weight class at the national championships in Cleveland. Randy Bahe, head coach of the Cow-

boys wrestling team and Bryce's father, said it's an honor no other Goodland wrestler has achieved in at least seven years.

Randy was named head coach last year after being an assistant coach for seven years. He said, he remembers two wrestlers qualifying for the na-

tlers qualify by placing first or second at a state tournament sometime during their high school career. He said Bryce placed sixth at state his freshman year, second as a sophomore and junior and third this year — after fighting mononucleosis for most of the season.

Randy said 725 wrestlers from across the country cluding 37 Kansas seniors.

The Kansas students wrestled as a team, the coach said, placing fourth in the tournament, the highest the state The top eight wrestlers in each

weight class earn the title All-American, he said, and nine Kansas students walked away with the designation.

"I'd have been proud of any of the wrestlers," he said. "As a father, a little more personal feelings are involved."

People may not realize what a major accomplishment it is, Randy said, adding that he witnessed "an amazing quality of wrestling." In Bryce's weight class, he said, there were four four-time state champions, one threetimer, two two-timers and several onetime champions. Bryce said he spent about a month

preparing — practicing with the Kansas Kids Wrestling team, wrestling in Hoxie and Colby and running three miles a day. The 18-year-old said it was "I was very excited," he said. "It's

been a goal for many years. I couldn't be much happier. I worked hard to get to that level and it paid off."

Bryce said it was a boost after a disappointing final high school season. He said he struggled with his stamina and at times felt like he didn't have the energy to finish a match.

Randy said Bryce was diagnosed with mono — a virus that can cause a person to feel tired and weak - last January, and still hasn't fully recov-

Bryce said he probably would have done better at the state tournament this year if he hadn't been ill. But, he added, he was proud of himself for overcoming that obstacle.

"I didn't let that get me down," he

Bryce said he was in a 64-man bracket in the nationals with five pigtail matches, which are held when there are more wrestlers than there is room in the bracket. The winner of each of those matches earns a space on the regular bracket, he said.

The wrestler said he finished with a 4-3 record, losing in the quarterfinals and then winning a consolation match to qualify as an All-American. He said he beat a two-time Wisconsin state champion and a two-time North Carolina state champ.



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
