Clarence Rieb

Clarence Rudolph Rieb, 74, a carpenter of Denver, formerly of Goodland and St. Francis, died Thursday, Oct. 31, 2002, in Denver.

He was born May 19, 1928, in St. Francis, one of nine children to William and Clara Rieb. Both parents were of German families that had come to the United States after having settled for some generations in the Odessa region of Russia.

Mr. Rieb was baptized at the Hope Valley Lutheran Church near St. Francis and was confirmed at the Zion Lutheran Church in St. Francis.

In 1946, Mr. Rieb joined the Marines and served for three years in the Philippines. He returned to Kansas and became a church worker for the American Lutheran Church in 1952, working one year in the United States building mission churches. He then went to Papua, New Guinea, where he continued that work for three years. He was active in the Luther League before and after his return.

He married Barbara Ochsner in Goodland in 1959. They moved to Denver in 1963 with their three children. They were active in the Lutheran congregation there, and their children attended Lutheran schools from grade school through high school.

The family became members of the Lutheran Valley Ranch in 1965. Mr. Rieb was a board member at the ranch and in the congregation and helped with various projects at the Lutheran Valley Ranch and Retreat.

He was skilled as a carpenter and in other work with his hands and worked for several companies in Denver, including Pella Windows. He worked for the past 14 years for Labor Saving Devices.

Preceding him in death were his parents; a sister, Elsie; and a brother, Frederick.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Tim (Donnie) Rieb of Brewster, Wash.; two daughters, Karlys Rieb of Littleton, Colo., and Karyn (Nick) Rieb Brettillo of Lakewood, Colo.; two brothers, Edwin and Marvin; four sisters, Edna, Deloris, Darlene and Iona; three granddaughters; and one great-granddaughter.

A service of thanksgiving to God was held Monday, Nov. 4, 2002, at the Denver Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. A family service and inurnment was held at the Goodland Cemetery Saturday, Dec. 14.

It's time to put away garden tools

It's time to put away the garden tools for the winter. While you're at it, make sure to store tools in good condition so they will last as long as possible.

Clean the metal surfaces of tillage and cultivating tools with a wire brush. Coat with a light lubricant such as WD-40 or light oil to keep the surface from rusting or corroding.

It is a good time to sharpen or straighten these tools as well.

Clean wooden handles with a wood preservative material that will clean the surface and add a slight amount of oil protection to prevent the grain from

loosening.

Don't use a standard oil lubricant on wood surfaces because they may collect more dust and dirt during next year's use. Clean and lubricate the tilling or cultivating parts of power tools as above. Drain the gas tank, remove

the spark plug and apply a slight sprayable oil lubricant into the cylinder head.

Replace the spark plug if it has been several seasons since you have done so. Check and change the oil if necessary.

Some people prefer to drain oil during the winter months, but if you do, be sure to clearly mark that the engine has no oil so you don't start it by accident next spring without oil in the engine.
