U.S. claims Iraq coverup

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration, concluding that Saddam Hussein is not serious about disarmament, turned today to convincing the U.N. Security Council that it should declare Iraq in violation and authorize war.

A senior administration official said today that President Bush has given the go-ahead to double the 50,000 U.S. troops deployed in the Persian Gulf region in early January. Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld is expected to sign the formal deployment order in the next week or two as part of what another official called "a ramping up on various fronts."

'This situation cannot continue," Secretary of State Colin Powell said Thursday in describing Iraq's weapons declaration, submitted two weeks ago, as 12,200 pages of lies, gaps and omissions.

Lott steps aside in wave of criticism

WASHINGTON — Bowing to harsh criticism from fellow senators and the Bush White House, Trent Lott resigned as Senate Republican leader today after colleagues lined up behind Sen. Bill Frist to replace him.

"In the interest of pursuing the best possible agenda for the future of our country, I will not seek to remain as majority leader of the United States Senate for the 108th Congress, effective Jan. 6, 2003," said Lott, whose fall was historically unprecedented on Capitol Hill.

President Bush released a statement hailing Lott's service and saying he respected "the very

difficult decision" the Mississippian had to make.

Lott himself stayed away from the cameras. At his Pascagoula, Miss., home, his wife gave reporters a written statement from Lott saying, "My official written statement was released from Washington at 11 EST. There will be no underlying statement to the television media. Please go

The note, handwritten on U.S. Senate stationary with "Office of the Majority Leader" across the top, was signed "Trent Lott.'

With Lott's departure, Frist, a close ally of Bush, was the only publicly declared candidate to replace him and quickly emerged as the favorite, lawmakers and aides said.

The Tennessee lawmaker, a wealthy heart surgeon, announced his candidacy Thursday evening and had garnered support from several key senators, including Sens. Mitch McConnell of Kentucky, No. 2 Senate Republican Don Nickles of Oklahoma, and John Warner of Vir-

McConnell, a Lott supporter said to be interested in succeeding him, issued a statement saying he would not seek the job and endorsed Frist. GOP lawmakers and aides said Sen. Rick Santorum of Pennsylvania, another Lott supporter, was considering a challenge, but Frist seemed likely to prevail.

"I think it's pretty much over," said one GOP

lawmaker who asked not to be named. "With McConnell and Nickles behind Frist, I think it's

Nickles, a longtime Lott rival, was the first GOP senator to call for new leadership elections.

The 51 GOP senators who will serve in the next Congress plan to meet Jan. 6 to elect their next

Senate Democratic Leader Tom Daschle of South Dakota called Lott's resignation "the right decision for Sen. Lott and for the Senate."

But he said the new GOP leader must "now do more than merely disavow Sen. Lott's words. He

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Officers discover meth lab

Evening raid nets drugs in Kanorado

Drug agents raided a Kanorado garage Thursday, seizing what they called an active methamphetamine lab, plus several guns. The owner was arrested later by Kan-

sas Bureau of Investigation agents in Cheyenne County. Sheriff Doug Whitson said a search

warrant was executed Thursday evening at Scotty's Motor Co., 209 Main St., Kanorado. He said the meth lab was found in the basement. Scott Baumfalk, 36, owner of the

business, was found in Cheyenne County by KBI agents and Doug Murphy, investigator for the Quad County Drug Task Force. Sherman Whitson said Baumfalk

was arrested between 8 and 9 p.m. and was being held in the Sherman County

"I expect further arrests to be made," Whitson added, saying that the search warrant was part of an ongoing inves-We have been investigating this

man for about three years," Whitson said. "We had suspected meth activity, but it was only with the help of the Quad County Task Force and the Kansas Bureau of Investigation that we were able to get what we needed to execute the search warrant."

Officers of the sheriff's office, KBI, Ouad County Task Force and the Goodland Police went to the garage about 6 p.m. and forcibly entered the building.

"We found an active meth lab in the basement," Whitson said. "The KBI agents took it apart, and we seized several weapons during the search."

Whitson said he had no idea about what quantity of meth was being pro-

He said the KBI and Drug Enforcement Agency will clean up the site, and the material will be taken for laboratory

"We finally got all the pieces put together," Whitson said. "We had some inside information that gave us the information we needed for the search

"I expect a sizable drop in meth drug traffic because of this action."


The task force includes Sherman, Thomas, Gove, Logan and Wallace counties and the cities in those counties. The group kept it's name after expanding to five counties.
