Harry Samuelson

Harry Victor Samuelson, 84, of Frankfurt, a former teacher in Ruleton, died Tuesday, Dec. 10, 2002, at Onaga Community Hospital.

He was born Aug. 12, 1918, in Garrison, the son of R.D. and Ida Johnson Samuelson. He was baptized and confirmed in the Mariadahl Lutheran Church in the Blue Valley.

While growing up, Mr. Samuelson liked to help his uncles on their farms. He attended school in Olsburg, then went to Bethany College, where he received his bachelor of arts degree in economics and business.

While at his first administrative/ teaching job in Ruleton, a cute young thing caught his eye. After she finished high school, he was able to pursue the relationship. After two years of teaching, he joined the war effort by entering midshipman school in New York. He was deployed to the South Atlantic on the USS Omaha.

After the war, Mr. Samuelson married the cute young thing, Eunice J. Duell, on Nov. 9, 1945, at Kanorado.

He attended Kansas State University to pursue a master's degree in education. He taught, was principal or superintendent at schools in Ruleton, Olsburg, Council Grove, Dunlap, Wilsey, Reading, Summerfield and finally Frankfort.

He continued in the Naval Reserve and spent many summers on active duty in Bainbridge, Md., as administrator of the Naval Preparatory School, retiring as a commander in 1969.




