## Santa delivering wheels to local kids

Eighteen shiny new bicycles are lined up in Joe Russell's garage, awaiting the culmination of over two months of work by Russell and other volunteers who will deliver the bikes to children Wednesday.

Russell will drive Glenn Johnson Sr. of South Dakota, dressed as Santa Claus, to deliver the bikes starting at 8 a.m. on Wednesday. He will also have Brandon Terry, a Goodland police officer, along to show the children there is a good side to police officers.

Often children are afraid of police officers, Russell said, because they think of the police as only being around when something bad happens.

Russell said he has been working for over two months to raise donations to pay for the bicycles, buying the bicycles and finding children to give them to.

To find the kids, Russell said, he started with a list from The Goodland Daily News of children who wrote letters to Santa and then called parents to ask if they would be interested in having bikes brought to their children.

That wasn't very productive, he said, so he took the list to the elementary schools and asked people there who knew the children to mark the ones they thought would deserve and appreciate bicycles.

From the narrowed-down list, Russell said, he found parents interested in having bikes for their children more quickly.

He made several trips to Wal-Mart to buy bikes, Russell said, and the store donated four and gave him a 10 percent discount on the rest. If it weren't for that and the donations from businesses and individuals in the area, he said, the Christmas trip would not be possible.

Although there were a few people who feared a scam, he said, many were eager to help, even a man from New

He went to McB's Motor and Radiator Repair, Russell said, to ask if the usiness would donate. The New Jersey man was having his car fixed so he could go home, Russell said, and overheard the conversation and offered the money he had in his wallet.

Russell said he has given bikes and/ or clothes for the past eight years, with the exception to last year, his first in Russell said, he alternated between giving coats and bikes. One year, he said, he gave away 36 used bikes and spent July through December putting them

Goodland. When he lived in Denver, cycles to give to children and is planning to clean and repair used bicycles to offer to the parents to ride with their kids. The goal was 20 bikes, he said, and next year's goal is 30. He would like to

Russell wants to expand his giving to include a bike a month at the elementary schools so all of the children who have birthdays that month could enter a drawing to win it. He said he hasn't have 100 to give eventually, Russell talked to anyone at the schools about it said, but that would take a lot of volun-

## **Toys for Tots program** helps over 200 children

started in Sherman County in 1991, and has continued to grow. He said this year, they were able to collect over \$1,500 to buy toys for children, more than has ever come in since he took over organizing the event in 1994.

starts in early November as families begin to sign up for assistance with Genesis. He says Toys for Tots began working with only one agency, Genesis, to eliminate overlap and to be able to know an exact number of families who need assistance.

is hard at work, canvassing the county for donations of toys or money. He makes sure all the donations go to families in Sherman County and that all the money raised to buy toys is spent in the county.

"Many businesses have been good to donate, as well as individuals and groups such as the Kiwanis," he said.

Once the list has been made — and checked twice — Studer and his band of elves (he has help from his wife, Leena, and another, Don Zimbelman)

go to work shopping for the children, from newborn to 16. On the list, there For over 200 children in Sherman are no specific names, just different age groups and the number of children in each. If there are five boys on the list who are 8, Studer says they try to buy 15 gifts suitable for them, three for each

Once the gifts are bought, they are taken to the First United Methodist Church, where they are given out along with food baskets from Genesis. This year, five pickup loads of gifts were Each year, Studer says, the toy drive delivered to the church and given to families. To make sure there is no mixup, the gifts are left unwrapped so the families can take them home.
