Friday morning, the band will head for St. Gerard High for rehearsal, and there will be a mass band rehearsal after lunch. That evening, there will be a dinner and dance at the San Antonio Convention Center.

Saturday, the band will head for the Alamo Dome at 7 a.m. for a mass band rehearsal. They will return to the hotel about noon, and have some time to relax or check out the surrounding area.

At 3:30 p.m., they will head back to the Alamo Dome in full uniform for the game, which is set to kick off at 6 p.m. The contest is between the University of Colorado and University of Wisconsin. The mass bands will perform during the game, which may be seen on ESPN.

Man arrested for murder and '93 Colby rape

is suspected in the 1993 rape of a Colby Community College student.

Jones said that Wichita and Colby police, the Kansas Bureau of Investigation and other police agencies now believe Belt is responsible for the rape in Colby. along with others in Salina and Wichita. In one of the Salina cases, the women was

severely injured in the attack. Jones said officials linked Belt to the crimes through DNA matches by the Kansas Bureau of Investigation lab.

In the Colby case, he said, Belt was a suspect, but was never charged, after police were notified that a woman had been raped in the 1100 block of South

Franklin Ave. After the incident was reported. Colby police asked for help from residents since the attacker fled on foot from the 20-year-old woman's apartment. People were asked to watch out for a man that might have been walking or fleeing in the College Drive area in the late afternoon that Thursday some nine years ago.

Jones said, the victim was injured but was treated and released from Citizens

Medical Center. Other charges pending against Belt may include robbery, Wichita police said. He is being held in the Sedgwick County Jail.

Jones said he would provide more information as it is made available.



wins jackpot DES MOINES — Someone who bought a lottery ticket in West Virginia won the \$314.9 million jackpot in Wednesday's Powerball

drawing, a lottery official said. Multi-State Lottery Association drawing manager Sue Dooley said no other information on the winner would be released for now.

An unexpected Christmas Day run on Powerball tickets pushed the already whopping \$280 million jackpot to \$314.9 million just before numbers were drawn, making it the lottery's largest prize ever.

The numbers in Wednesday night's drawing were 5-14-16-29-53 and the Powerball was 7. The prize would be the third-largest

lottery jackpot in U.S. history. Powerball, the nation's largest lottery, is run by the Multi-State Lottery Association and is played in 23 states, the District of Columbia and the U.S. Virgin Islands.
