Leland Neal Hill Leland Neal Hill, 75, a former teacher and wrestling coach at Sherman County High School, died Wednesday, Dec. 25, 2002, following a month-long stay in the Minneola District Hospital

in Mineola. He was born April 16, 1927, in Cheyenne County, the son of Merl Melvin and Stella Lourine (Todd) 12 children. He began his education in a rural school in Chey-

enne County but transferred to St. Francis Grade School.

Mr. Hill attended St. Francis High School from 1941-45, received a bachelor of arts degree in education from Fort Hays Kansas State Teachers College in 1958, took graduate classes at Pittsburg State University and received a master's degree in education from Northwestern State University in Alva, Okla., in 1973.

As a youth, he had many after-school jobs including being a paper carrier for Grit, and working at The St. Francis Herald, the theater and service stations. He was baptized in the Christian Church as a teen-ager.

Mr. Hill enlisted in the Navy as a Seabee immediately before his 18th birthday and participated in Navy wrestling teams.

He was stationed in the Philippines during World War II and received medals for the Asiatic Pacific Occupation, Naval Occupation, World War II Victory, the Asiatic Pacific Campaign and the American Theater Campaign Rib-

After being honorably discharged in August 1946, he resumed work at *The* St. Francis Herald. In the fall of 1951, he moved to Goodland and worked at The Goodland Daily News and the Sherman County Herald.

From 1958-67, he taught English and journalism at Sherman County High School and was the wrestling coach for a few of those years.

He taught English and journalism and was the golf coach at Ashland High retired in 1989 due to health problems.

Mr. Hill married Betty Eileen Got-seven brothers, Ted Hill, Ron (Dot) chall on Dec. 20, 1952, at the Raton, Hill, Bill Hill, Ed (Barbara) Hill, Dale N.M., Methodist Church.
