Tattoo veteran relates battle with hepatitis C, side effects of medicine

I would like to share an e-mail letter I received from a reader regarding my Nov. 7 column "Teenagers Getting Tattoos Risk Infection If Sharing Needles." This person felt so strongly about the risks kids take, he felt that maybe sharing his own personal ordeal might help others. Part One was in the Friday, Dec. 27, issue of The Goodland Daily News.

The letter began:

Dear Cris:

This letter has taken some time to write and a lot of courage. As you read on you will understand. I wanted to commend you on your column.

I remember your article stated that a local Mom asked you to reprint this article. What really got my attention was that her daughter and a friend wanted to save \$10 on their tattoos by sharing the same needle. I will save them both the price of those tattoos and both of their parents enough money for two years of college. With all that being said, here goes.

Let's figure what this is going to cost for 12 months of treatment, and this is just an average:

• The first 2 blood tests were \$1,050.

• Then there were 12 more at \$500 each for a total of \$6,000.

• For 12 months of Peg-Intron it's \$13.449

• For 12 months of Rebetol it's \$22,338.

This adds up to a 12 month total cost of \$42.836.

I felt like a hupersonal nurse called, yes I have a man vibrator, still shaking and can't I'm drinking lots of water and fruit

she said it may happen a couple of more times until my body gets used to the drugs. This is like chemotherapy. The side effects include flu-like symptoms, upset stomach, fever, achy muscles, loss of appetite, hair falling out. Thankfully, I have thick hair because no one can cuts my hair can tell, but it's really not that noticeable.

Suicide is a side effect in 1 percent of the people who use these drugs. Don't worry—life isn't that bad, and if I ever get to feeling like that, I have family and friends I can talk to.

So far, the only real side effects Thursdays any more; I pretty much sleep the day away, and I don't have much of an appetite; my muscles ache; I have a fever and hot and cold spells, but not the shaking anymore. I've lost 10-15 pounds, and people can tell.

I have days when I just can't get enough to eat and it makes up for the days I really don't feel like eating. juices but am dehydrated most of
