Jan. 12, 1903: Pleasant Home news — Real estate changed hands quite a bit Wednesday without consent of the owners.

Jan. 13, 1903: Tuesday, the county commissioners purchased the Burroughs registering accoun-

courthouse for several months. The machine is provided with a keyboard and is operated similar to a typewriter.

It will add, subtract and multiply, the totals being immediately reached by working a lever. As the keys are struck, a record is made on a strip of paper by type impressions through an ink ribbon. The "arithmometer" is a very great aid to the county clerk and county treasurer in work on tax rolls. The price of the machine is \$250, but a less up-todate machine, purchased when R.J. Jones was treasurer, was turned in for \$50, so the new one cost \$200.
