Jan. 17, 1903: E. Thorson has received a shipment from Dresden, Germany, of 1,700 pieces of the famous Dresden china. He sent the order last February, and the ware arrived just a few days ago. There is a novel feature about the china. Under the transparent glazing is burnt in photographic scenes of different parts of Goodland. The pictures are quite faithfully portrayed and done in colors. The round house and machine shops, court house, school house, boulevard and depot hotel are among the collections. Mr. Thorson was making preparations to display his line of dishes in the Sharp building before the fire. The china, which includes a great variety of dishes, will be sold out soon. Samples were on display at Arensberg & Collen's drug store Monday evening.

Jan. 18, 1903: Engineers get a raise in wage — New wage scale will go into force over the Rock Island system. The new schedule of wages approximates a 10 percent raise of wages for engineers. As an illustration: an engineer on passenger who formerly received \$3.50 per hundred miles will get \$3.90, and engineers on through freight who formerly received \$4 will get \$4.30, and engineers on local freight will get \$4.50. Overtime is raised accordingly.
