Freshman Jalyn Reid was the floor-leader for the Brewster Lady Bulldogs in the fourth quarter Friday against the Goodland Cowgirls, but it was Goodland freshman Justeen Koehler who got the last

word in Goodlandís 59-54 victory. With 1:20 remaining in the game, Reid stole the ball from Goodland and drew a foul on Stephanie Fairbanks while missing the layup. Reid missed the first free throw but sank the second one to put the Bulldogs up 54-52. That's when Koehler hit a shot that drew high praise from Coach Connie Livengood. Koehler's jump shot with 1:06 remaining tied it up at 54-54 and sparked Goodland to a 5-0 run during the final minute of play.

"A freshman on the floor came in and made a clutch shot to tie it up," coach Livengood said after the team and calming down," close win.

Jayci Stone sank two freethrows and a field goal and Fairbanks added another freethrow to seal the win in the final minute. Stone also hit a buzzer beater at the end of the first quarter to give the Cowgirls a 17-16 lead. Stone stole the ball on defense and took a couple of dribbles before releasing the shot on the run with her toe just over the the glass and into the basket as the steal.

"I think we played better defense, but we played a better team. A team that was here to play," Livengood said

That defense included outstanding play by Tess Schultz and Kendra Billinger who were assigned Alicia Collett and Andrea Horney. Both players had picked away at Goodland's defense during the second half and the tough defense applied to them during the second half forced Brewster to look to other players to score.

A tough game against a young team forced the Cowgirls to dig deep for the win.
