Jan. 30, 1903: Dr. H.P. Gandy returned from Topeka where he had been pushing his contest to oust Dr. Smith as representative of Sherman County. Dr. Gandy's complaint states that several illegal votes were cast for Dr. Smith, including four railroad votes, which were cast at Phillipsburg and then sent to Goodland, and that several votes cast for Dr. Gandy were thrown out. Also, Dr. Gandy claims that "several electors in McPherson township were induced by the promise of a valuable consideration to vote for Smith.
