Feb. 2, 1903: An electric light has been installed at the railroad shops and will shed its brilliant rays along the ranks of the machines on the west side of the shop.

Feb. 3, 1903: Gust Strand this week hauled rock from the wheat pit of the old Weber elevator site to the Dawson block, where it will be used for foundations. When Weber built his elevator, he shipped in seven carloads of white lime stone and now it is again being put to good use.

Feb. 4, 1903: An effort is being made by the people of Sherman County to have the legislature pass a law to reopen all section lines in this county with petitions being forwarded to the legislature.

Originally section lines were open highways, but two years ago, in the interest of capitalists and cattle barons, a law was stealthily pushed through the legislature permitting the fencing of section lines by large holders, providing some sort of gates were put in to allow travel, and the same law imposes a penalty upon any traveler who should go through the gate and fail to close it after him.

This law was very unpopular when it became known to the people. It is hoped that section lines will be reopened and that the penalty will be for fencing the public highway. It is a conspicuous fact that for a number of years the representatives from Sherman County have hardly kept themselves in touch with the people they represent, and thus it comes that we have been wronged by surreptitious encroachment.

Feb. 5, 1903: The Philharmonic Lady quartet of Chicago will give an entertainment at the opera house. An organization of this kind tones up the culture and musical taste of the town, and a loyal patronage by the people will aid not a little in inducing other high class entertain-

Rose M. Hayden, 89, a Sherman County homemaker, died Saturday, Feb. 1, 2003, at the Goodland Regional Medical Center.

She was born April 18, 1913, in Rooks County on the Hrabe family farm northeast of Plainville, to Agnes (Harmacek) and Joseph Hrabe. She attended a one-room school known as the Hrabe School.

In 1939, she married Robert John Hayden Sr. in Concordia and moved to a farm southwest of Goodland. Though the Haydens enjoyed country life, they moved to Goodland after seven years so their children could attend school. Mrs. Hayden called that house her home until her death.

She enjoyed cooking, and her family especially enjoyed her golden fried chicken. Hayden also enjoyed quilting, needlework, playing cards and gardening.

After her husband's death, Hayden participated in the management of the family farm. Although, her formal education ended at the eighth grade, she encouraged higher education for her family and others. She was a member of the Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church.

Survivors include a son, Robert J. (Cynthia) Hayden of Albuquerque, N.M.; two daughters, Mary Lou (Robert) Teeters of Joplin, Mo., and Sally Jo (Lee) Sherman of Broken Arrow, Okla.; seven grandchildren; and 10 great-grandchildren.

Clarence Cogdill

Clarence L. Cogdill, 93, a retired Goodland railroad worker, died Thursday evening, Jan. 30, 2003, at the Sherman County Good Samaritan Center, where he had been a resident since 1999.

He was born Feb. 1, 1909, in Stanberry, Mo., the son of Arval E. and Mary May (Jennings) Cogdill. When Clarence was eight, the family moved to Allison, south of Jennings in Decatur County, where he attended school.

Cogdill enlisted in the Army in 1942 and served in Gen. Patton's 3rd Army. His unit moved through France into Belgium, through Austria into Germany and North Africa.

At war's end, he was in Casablanca, Morocco. Because the United States needed its railroaders back as soon after the war as possible, he was flown back via B-17 bomber to Natal, Brazil, and then to Miami, Fla. From there, he rode a troop train to Fort Logan, Colo., where he was discharged in 1945.

He married Opal Johnson April 18, 1946, in Norton. He had started working for the Rock Island Railroad in 1929 and retired in 1974, having attained over 45 years of seniority, the longest career of any Rock Island employee between Chicago and Denver.

The Cogdills moved to Goodland in 1967. Mr. Cogdill was a member of the Brotherhood of Maintenance Way of Employees and a life-time member of the American Legion.

Preceding him in death were his parents; three brothers, Walter, James and Eugene; an infant sister; and two other sisters, Joyce and Viola.

Survivors include his wife, a Good Samaritan Center resident; a son, Arval (Myla) Cogdill of Conway, Ark.; two brothers, Lawrence of New Hampton, Mo., and George of Colorado Springs; two brothers-in-law, Falster (Aileen) Johnson and Harry (Leta) Johnson, both of Norton; a sister-in-law, Marie Engelhardt of Norton; and two grandchildren.

Dale Bishop

Dale Eugene Bishop, 78, a retired highway worker from St. Francis, died Thursday, Jan. 30, 2003, at his home.

He was born April 13, 1924, the son of Bertha Mae (Zimbelman)

and Clarence Ray Bishop. As a boy, he attended school and helped his father on the family farm near Dodge City. When his parents moved to Stratton, Colo., he stayed with his aunt to finish school and graduated from Dodge City High School in 1942.

Bishop was drafted into the Army in 1943 and served in the Philippines, where he was wounded in action. When he was discharged from the Army in 1947, he moved to New Bloomfield, Mo., where he met and later married Bonnie Lou Gray in 1950.

The Bishops moved to Mexico, Mo., where he worked at the A.P. Green Brick Plant. The family lived

there five and a half years before moving to Seibert, Colo., in 1957, where he was a farmer and a school bus driver.

In 1960, the family moved to Sterling, Colo., where he was a cattle feeder for Don Hamil. Bishop accepted his alcoholism and became a lifetime member of Alcoholics Anonymous in 1970.

Bishop began working for the Colorado Highway Department, based in Holyoke, Colo., in 1972. He retired in 1988 and moved to St. Francis in 1990.

He battled diabetes and cancer for several years and during that struggle, accepted Jesus Christ as his savior in 2001.

Preceding him in death were his

parents; his infant brother, John; twin siblings, Marjorie and Marvin; and two grandsons, Thomas Ashley Cox and Charles Dale Cox.
