Feb. 2, 1903: An electric light has been installed at the railroad shops and will shed its brilliant rays along the ranks of the machines on the west side of the shop.

Feb. 3, 1903: Gust Strand this week hauled rock from the wheat pit of the old Weber elevator site to the Dawson block, where it will be used for foundations. When Weber built his elevator, he shipped in seven carloads of white lime stone and now it is again being put to good

Feb. 4, 1903: An effort is being made by the people of Sherman County to have the legislature pass a law to reopen all section lines in this county with petitions being forwarded to the legislature.

Originally section lines were open highways, but two years ago, in the interest of capitalists and cattle barons, a law was stealthily pushed through the legislature permitting the fencing of section lines by large holders, providing some sort of gates were put in to allow travel, and the same law imposes a penalty upon any traveler who should go through the gate and fail to close it after him.

This law was very unpopular when it became known to the people. It is hoped that section lines will be reopened and that the penalty will be for fencing the public highway. It is a conspicuous fact that for a number of years the representatives from Sherman County have hardly kept themselves in touch with the people they represent, and thus it comes that we have been wronged by surreptitious encroachment.

Feb. 5, 1903: The Philharmonic Lady quartet of Chicago will give an entertainment at the opera house. An organization of this kind tones up the culture and musical taste of the town, and a loyal patronage by the people will aid not a little in inducing other high class entertain-
