Advance voting for the school board and Kanorado primary elections begins today in the Sherman County Clerk's office.

The primary will be held Tuesday, Feb. 25, to narrow the field for the election of Goodland school board members and for mayor of Kanorado.

The general election for these positions and for Goodland City Commission and Kanorado City Council will be Tuesday, April 1.

Advance voting will be available until noon on Monday, Feb. 24, County Clerk Janet Rumpel said. Voters may call the office at 899-4800 to request an advance ballot by mail.

To receive a ballot by mail the voter is required to sign a form and return it to the clerk's office as soon as possible. The ballot can be mailed out, but must be returned by election day. Ballots will not be mailed out after Friday, Feb. 21, Rumpel said.

Ten people have filed to fill the four positions on the Goodland school board, and three people have filed for Kanorado mayor. A primary is held when more than twice as many people file as there are positions open said Rumpel.

Hazel Estes, current Kanorado mayor, an insurance agent, is being opposed by Gerald Webber, a parttime postal contract driver, and Bob Handle, a self-employed businessman

Current school board members who have filed for re-election are Eric Gray, a city water department employee; Ben Duell, a Ruleton farmer; Jane Philbrick, a farm wife and part-time employee at Mann's Jewelry; and Kathy Russell, county probation officer.

Danny Whalen, owner of Dairy Queen; Pamela Galindo, a daycare provider; Gary L. Smith, veterinarian at Prairieland Animal Clinic; Martin Melia, owner of KLOE. KWGB and KKCI radio; Fritz Doke, a service technician for S&T Telephone; and Burton Pianalto, an instructor at Northwest Kansas Technical College; have filed for election to the school board. The board is made up of seven members, and a chairman is chosen from the group. All registered voters in the district are eligible to vote for the four school board seats, which are chosen at large. Those registered in Kanorado will vote on the mayor race as well as the school board. The voters will cast ballots for four people for the school board positions, and Rumpel said the top eight candidates will move on to the general election. In Kanorado, people will vote for the one they want to be mayor, and the top two candidates will be on the general election ballot.

The brainchild of Brewster area farmer Leonard Kinkade and his wife Zelma, the rally is scheduled for 3 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 22, at the 4-HBuilding on the Thomas County Fairgrounds.

"We hope to see people from all over northwest Kansas, from Trego County west to the Colorado line and north to Nebraska," Kinkade said. "Farmers, ranchers, ag and machinery people, clergy, townsfolk — this first-ever Northwest Kansas Rally for Rain is for everyone.

Patrol checking out child seat safety

The Goodland Star-News Kansas Highway Patrol troopers helped parents fasten down their car seats on Sunday as they did a child safety seat check at Wal-Mart for Child Passenger Safety Week.

This week has been set aside to promote proper child restraints and seatbelts by Gov. Kathleen Sebelius. Troopers in this area will be watching all week to make sure children and adults are properly restrained in their vehicles.

On Sunday, the patrol set up a check lane at Wal-Mart to allow people to come and be sure that their childrens' car seats are safe and installed properly. Trooper Joe Green of Goodland said two officers, David Albers of Goodland and Brian Horney of Brewster, are certified to inspect safety seat installation and use. Both Albers and Horney were available Sunday to inspect seats for parents.

Horney said today 11 car seats were checked, and all of them needed some work. The officers gave a new seat to one family whose seat was over 10 years old.

"Three seats were not installed right, the others were in OK, but they were just loose," Horney said.

pointment with either officer to do an inspection.

'Children are our lives," said Horney. "We need to think about them first and make sure they are safe."

Green said officers will be spend-

seat and up to age 4, they must ride in a child safety seat, regardless of their weight.

Green said 80 percent of all car seats are misused. He encouraged parents to have their car seats inspected by the certified officers to make sure they are installed correctly.

He said he had his child's' car seat inspected by Albers, only to find it wasn't in properly.

"People think they have them in properly, but they don't," Green said. "There are many types and they often can be difficult to install."

Green said 40 percent of young riders go completely unrestrained in a moving car. If someone is pulled over for having a child unrestrained while driving, they will be ticketed, with a \$74 fine.

The troopers offered suggestions:

• Use a rear-facing child safety seat for babies from birth to 20 pounds and a year old.

• Use a forward-facing seat for children who are at least 20 pounds and 1 year old, to 40 pounds and around 4 years old.

 Booster seats are for children 40-80 pounds, less than four feet tall. Never use a seat with only a lap belt.
