Feb. 14, 1903: Mrs. Maud Lee seeks divorce — husband denied her postage stamps and whipped her pet dog. Action Asks for Alimony - defendant leaves Goodland for parts unknown to avoid personal service.

The most sensational divorce case in the history of Goodland has been started by Mrs. Maud Lee against her husband, Charles H. Lee. It is a suit out of the ordinary, and if Mrs. Lee makes her case stick, every husband who may have sinned in the things she tells on Mr. Lee, he had henceforth better keep the stamp box well filled and live on speaking terms with his wife's pet dog.

The suit for divorce was filed in the district court in Kansas City, Kan. The petition relates, among other things, that the husband, although possessing \$100,000 worth of property, failed and refused to buy postage stamps for his wife's letters written to relatives. It further recites that shortly after the honeymoon in May 1897, the husband whipped her pet dog with his buggy whip. The wife remonstrated and thereupon the husband turned on her with the whip and struck her several times. Mrs. Lee asks for alimony and for costs in the case.

Mrs. Lee left for Kansas City about two months ago. It was known publicly that domestic infelicity had arisen in that family, and those acquainted with the reports of the case fully expected that, if any divorce proceedings were begun, Mr. Lee would be the plaintiff. The surprise was complete — perhaps not excepting Mr. Lee — when information came that his wife had started suit for divorce. Mr. Lee changed his base of operations and is reported to have left for parts unknown to avoid personal service in the suit, which is required when alimony is sought.

The action for divorce has caused quite a flurry in social circles, and each side has its unsolicited supporters with ready opinions. Mr. and Mrs. Lee were married about six years ago and took up residence on a farm just east of the city limits. A short time ago, Lee sold his farm and, until the rupture came, they lived in his office building in Goodland.

Feb. 16, 1903: Temperance Meetings — Mrs. Sena Hartzell Wallace spoke at Edson Wednesday evening and at Kanorado Thursday evening. Goodland people heard her Friday evening at the Methodist church and Sunday morning and evening at the Opera House.

The subject of her talk was "Character Building." She said that women were the leaders of men and that, if the young ladies only would, they could raise the morals of young men with whom they come in contact. She urged the necessity of a firm foundation and said that the corner stones should be, "total abstinence from the use of intoxication drinks, total abstinence from the use of tobacco, the personal purity pledge and a fully consecrated life." A great many anti-tobacco pledges were signed by the boys of the town.
