Not only did he tear the anterior cruciate ligament, compiece of bone was also torn from the side of his knee.

Desperate to find the best surgeon so he could return to wrestling as soon as possible, Abbey said, he turned to the Internet. After some research, he found Dr. Rocci Trumper, an orthopedic surgeon in Fort Collins, Colo. Trumper, known for working with Olympic athletes, did surgery on Abbey on Aug. 6, after the swelling from the injury had gone down.
