## School board field narrowed to eight

The fields of candidates for the Goodland School Board and Kanorado mayor of were cut down in the mark four candidates for school primary election Tuesday, with 26 percent of the voters braving the cold to cast ballots.

The eight remaining school board candidates will have four weeks to campaign before the general election Tuesday, April 1. Candidates for city commission and Kanorado mayor and council will be on the

ballot also.

Voters in the primary were to board, and the top eight will be on the next ballot.

Finishing on top was Jane Philbrick with 511 votes. An incumbent board member, she is seeking re-election.

Fritz Doke was second with 503, Danny Whalen third at 448, and Marty Melia fourth at 444.

Based on the primary votes, Philbrick, Doke, Whalen and Melia would be the leaders, but that may change in the general election when more people are expected to vote.

Dr. Gary L. Smith was fifth with 425; Kathy Russell, an incumbent board member was sixth, 395; Ben Duell, also an incumbent board member, seventh at 393; and Eric Gray, another incumbent, eighth at 325.
