

# New laws, former gambler made 1903 news today in history

This County — Four acts touching the interests of Sherman County were passed by the legislature: Bill No.857, prohibiting the fencing the roads; Bill No. 483, changing the boundaries of certain school districts; Bill No. 626, fixing the boundaries of the city of Goodland; and Bill No. 433, legalizing the city

ordinances of Goodland. The last two bills were put through the legislature in the absence of records, which were destroyed by the January fire.

March 23, 1903: Hates What He Once Loved — Dick Gray, a Converted Gambler, Talks to the Methodist Church. Dick Gray of Norton last week announced to the people from the pulpit of the Methodist Church here that he had turned from his evil course and had set his face hard in the direction of the New

He spoke three nights and was a "drawing card" to many who were Made Lively — Mrs. Nellie Miller, curious to hear what the veteran of the green cloth had to say. The simple narration of the ways of the Goodland Sunday night to oppose gambler was simply astonishing.

He said that gambling was the hardest work in the world and that he had sat at a table as long as 36 hours at a stretch. The nervous strain from such sittings is almost prostrating and the effects felt long afterwards.

"These are the inevitable visitations upon the body," he said, "to say nothing of the deep despondency which comes when you quit loser. It racks the body and kills it is worse than hell: and for the sake of my wife, my children and myself, I have entered the wicket gate."

March 24, 1903: A Divorce Case wife of John A. Miller, a Rock Island brakeman, arrived in the divorce proceedings started by her husband in December. The petition asks for divorce upon the grounds of drunkenness, and judging from the somewhat spectacular settings of comedy which occurred along the street Monday night, there may be something in it. At least the conduct of the woman was rather capricious and unusual for one who might be adjudged to be in full possession of her wits.

When Mrs. Miller was informed cheerfulness and hope. It is not hell: she was the defendant in a divorce case brought by her husband, she wrote a letter to G.L. Calvert, attorney for the plaintiff, from Jackson-

ville, Ill., saying that she would fight the divorce and asking him to have the case continued until she could get here. She also requested the assignment of an attorney to defend her. She reached Goodland Sunday night. Monday night the woman was

somewhat disorderly on the street and was taken in charge by Sheriff Bradley.

She was temporarily put in jail, but upon request of the ladies of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, turned over to them. She returned east Tuesday night. The divorce case will be heard at the April term of the district court.
