Erma J. Eggers, 90, a Sherman County farm wife, died Tuesday, April 8, 2003, at Overland Park.

On Sept. 27, 1932, she married Herman C. Eggers in McDonald, and they farmed together in Sherman County until June of 1995, when they moved to Goodland. Mrs. Eggers enjoyed learning and earned her high school equivalency when she was 68. In 2003, to celebrate her 90th birthday, she and a daughter completed a book, "Roses of Burntwood - Stories from the Kansas Frontier." Preceding her in death were her husband of 64 years, five sisters and five brothers. Survivors include two sons.
