Boys grab first, girls second at Oberlin Invitational track meet

The Goodland High boys won the Oberlin Invitational track meet on Tuesday and the girls came in second, edged out by the home team. The Oberlin girls scored 104 points and the Cowgirls 101. The Cowboys ran away from the competition with 131 points. Norton, which came in second, had 102.

On the girls team, Kendra Billinger had a pair of first places while Alisha McKee and Jayci Stone had one each. Billinger and Tiffany Thomas finished one-two in both the 3,200- and 1,600-meter races.

Lance Tedford, Dan Melia, Jared Doke and the 4X100-meter relay team had first-place finishes for the boys.

The Kugel Hernia Repair procedure requires one small incision, 3-4 cm, or three small laparoscopic punctures to insert a unique, memory-recoil ring to assist in the attachment of the Kugel Hernia Patch.

The Kugel Hernia Repair procedure utilizes a tension-free surgical technique that requires only one anchoring stitch to hold the mesh Kugel patch in place. The patch covers the weakened area and greatly minimizes the chance of a recurrence. The Kugel patch not only fixes the current hernia, but it protects against any future hernia in the affected area.

The Kugel Hernia Repair procedure is offered as a 23-hour surgery, where typically the patient has day surgery at KCCMH, stays overnight and is checked by Dr. Frankum the next morning before being released from the hospital. However, in some instances, the patient may be released the same day of surgery, if their post-op recovery goes exceedingly well.

Dr. Frankum also performs General Surgery, Breast Biopsies, advanced Laparoscopic Surgery, Colonoscopies and surgical procedures to repair lower bowel and rectal complications at KCCMH in Burlington, CO.

Dr. Frankum holds his General Surgery Specialty Clinic at KCCMH on the second Thursday and Friday; and the fourth Tuesday of the Month (excluding holidays).
