The hail broke out all of the window glass in the south side of buildings in the town. J.M. Leonard; his wife; little daughter, 11 years old; and a son, six years old, were only about half way home when the storm struck them. The family lives about a mile and a half east of the city. Placing his wife and May 14, 1903: Money for children on the sheltered side, they punched full of holes. The crown was in better condition than the rim. That is because his head was in it, but the hail did not care much either way, for where they didn't go received an ugly bruise on one of his mother. The little girls had many May 15, 1903: Hail Storm at black and blue spots on her body,
