James Smith

James M. "Smitty" Smith, 79, a retired Goodland mortician and former city commissioner, died Tuesday, May 13, 2003, at Goodland Regional Medical Center, where he had been a patient for five days.

He was born Nov. 5, 1923, in McCook, Neb., the son of Sam and Yvonne (Woolard) Smith. The familv moved to Goodland when he was an infant. He graduated from Sherman County High School in 1942.

Smith enlisted in the U.S. Coast Guard in December 1942 and served until March 1946. On April 7, 1946, he married Kay Sage in Goodland.

He went back to school in 1949, attending the Kansas City School of Mortuary Science for three years. He worked with his father-in-law, Lester Sage, and eventually became a partner in Sage & Smith Funeral Home.
