Patrol ready for 'Buckle up' effort

The Kansas Highway Patrol will working with parents and drivers in the national "Buckle Up America" and "America Buckles Up Children" campaign next week.

State troopers, along with the Goodland Police and Sherman County sheriff's deputies, will concentrate on enforcing seatbelt and child passenger safety laws from Monday through May 26, which includes the Memorial Day holiday weekend.

Troopers say one of the most important points is to be sure that a child or infant seat is properly installed. Because there are so many types, most are not properly attached and could be dangerous to the child.

Officers will check seats and attachment during a child passenger under 14 to wear safety belts. Law



safety seat check from 5-7 p.m. on Friday, May 23, in the Wal-Mart parking lot. Specially trained troopers will help reinstall them if necessarv.

Kansas law requires all children under age 4 to travel in an approved child safety seat, and all children

enforcement officers may stop and tickets drivers whenever they see children unrestrained. Unbuckled adults in the front seat may be ticketed and fined when they are stopped for other traffic violations.

The Memorial Day holiday weekend traditionally begins the busy summer travel season. Drivers should expect heavy traffic, congestion and the beginning of summer road construction. Last year, two people deiced and 228 were injured in Kansas highway crashes over the Memorial Day weekend.
