Woman injured by horse's kick needed several stitches today in history

May 20, 1903: Mrs. Swan Nelson Seriously Injured by Kick of a Horse — Mrs. Swan Nelson, who with her husband, lives about four miles northwest of Goodland, was kicked in the face by a horse in the corral near the house. The force of the blow cut the flesh to the bone and left her in a dazed condition. Mrs. Nelson was brought into town, and the wound was dressed by Dr. Smith. Several stitches were taken to bring the separated flesh together.
