## Successful farmer, gardener lived southwest of Goodland

#### By Evelyn Ward

Sherman County Historical Society May 24, 1903: He is Successful Gardener—G.A. McClelland, who lives on section 18, township 9, range 40, about 10 miles southwest of Goodland, is a prosperous farmer and gardener. He does not have to work a garden, as he had 100 head of good cattle, the increase alone of which would bring him a good living. Mr. McClelland believes in turning soil into money as well as grass, and it seems as though the things he touches turn into gold. Last year, Mr. McClelland sold \$150 worth of garden vegetables from his plot. The crop of cabbage brought \$100 and the rest of the truck \$50.

Goodland always furnishes a ready market, and no difficulty was found in disposing of everything he had to sell. Besides cabbage, he raised tomatoes, beans, lettuce, radishes and various kinds of garden stuff.


