Normal Institute had few members for several reasons

Sherman County Historical Society June 10, 1903: The Sherman County Normal Institute for 1903 opened June 1. At the beginning, the membership was so small owing partly to the lack of entertainment, partly to lack of boarding places and partly to the refusal of some of the teachers to comply with the new certificate law.

The registration has, however, reached the 40 mark, and the number is increasing daily. The average attendance of Sherman County's normals in recent years has been about 75.

June 11, 1903: Must Dip Infected Cattle — Rigid Quarantine on Cattle in Short Grass Country -Governor Bailey's Proclamation Prevents Shipping Infected Cattle or Even Moving Them From One Pasture to Another — Gov. The counties referred to are occupied by cattle owners and principally used in large open range or large pastures, and it will require Alpheus Berry and Burch Berry the most stringent methods to stamp out this disease. These counties include Cheyenne, Rawlins, Sherman, Thomas, Wallace and Logan.

Cold Blood — Coroner's Verdict Says Killing of Berrys Was Premeditated — Chauncey Dewey, Clyde Wilson and William McBride Under Grave Charges at St. Francis — In Custody of State Militia to Protect Them From Retribution of People — During all of Thursday and Friday there was a continual stream of people from the surrounding country to the place where the shooting occurred.
