Board raises pay for all substitutes

The Goodland Star-news Substitute teachers are hard to find, and the Goodland School Board approved a raise of \$10 per day Monday to try to keep those the district has been using.

"I am not sure a raise will help that much," Superintendent Marvin Selby told the board Monday, "and it is hard to find substitutes, but we one without a deficit," Selby said. have some good ones and this might help keep them."

The board unanimously approved raising the substitute pay for the next school year from \$60 a day to \$70 a day for those with an emergency certificate, and from \$70 to \$80 for those with a full teaching certificate. Board member Kathy Russell asked if there was as restriction on how many days a person with an emergency certificate can substitute, and Selby said there used to be tougher restrictions. He said the limit now is 90 days per semester for ing \$62,985, and a transfer from the those with the emergency certificate.

The board reviewed the financial status of the district. Selby said the transportation fund was \$87,000 in the district enrollment went from the hole, And he would recommend a transfer at the next meeting to cover this

"This includes the two busses we bought," Selby said. "The costs were less than last year and included the new Suburban."

He said the district in-service training fund will be zeroed out this year, and that next year each building will have money for training in their budget.

Teachers can request their summer check in one lump, and Selby said there was some concern that with the delay in the state money this might make it questionable as to whether there was enough cash to make the payroll. However, he said it appears they will be able to make the payroll with the cash available.

We are not a rich district," Board President Dick Short said, "but we have a well managed school district."
