Doctor came to Goodland but refused to buy license

June 24, 1903: Won't Pay the License — H. Granger Haxby, a specialist in the treatment of the eye and ear, billed himself for Goodland on the 15th and 16th. When he arrived, however, he found that a city ordinance imposed a tax of \$25 a day for itinerant doctors, and as the amount of the tax put the prospects in the shade, he failed to put out his shingle.

June 25, 1903: Invents 'Hold Up' Flytrap — W.J. Purvis, Machin-

ist at the Rock Island Shops, Patents Clever Device — The latest invention designed to exterminate the pesky fly is the "Hold Up" fly trap invented and patented by W.J. Purvis of this city.

The device is for catching flies from the ceiling at night, and tests with the trap have proved great success. Mr. Purvis has made a number of the traps for his neighbors, and they all say it is just the thing needed

by every housewife.

More "Hold Ups" will be manufactured soon and placed for sale with Donly & Scott. Until equipments are provided for the rapid manufacture of the fly traps at reduced cost of construction, they will be sold at \$1.00. The inventor conceived of the device about two years ago and has been working the thing toward perfection.

His patent covers a fly extermi-

nator which is sure to be a good seller and will fill a long felt want.

June 26, 1903: Automobile Passes Through — A four horse power automobile carrying four passengers hauled up for repairs here Wednesday afternoon. Mr. and Mrs. W.W. Taylor and their two children have traveled in their auto from Attica, Harper County, to Goodland, a distance of 300 miles in three days.

June 27, 1903: Court of Inquire Here — Testimony in Dewey-Berry Murder Case to be Taken — Attor-

ney E.F. Murphy received a telegram from Attorney General Coleman stating that Captain Clad Hamilton of Topeka will be in Goodland to enter upon the duties of taking testimony in the Dewey-Berry case. It is not known how many witnesses will be heard, but the state will be ably represented.

Goodland student wins nearly \$4,000 scholarship from company

A Goodland student at Northwest Kansas Technical College won nearly \$4,000 in scholarships from a California auto parts company.
