J. Marion Hallagin

James Marion Hallagin, 88, a McDonald farmer, died Thursday, July 3, 2003, at the Atwood Good Samaritan Center.

He was born May 8, 1915, at Cheyenne County, the son of Lee and Bertha Mae (Banister) Hallagin. His early school years were in one-room schools in and around Cheyenne County. He later attended school in McDonald.

On July 24, 1937, he married Marie A. Anderson in Bird City.

He was a heavy equipment operator for Rawlins County, a farmer, a harvester, an irrigation driller and a school bus driver.

Hallagin was known for his community service and spent years in the Civilian Conservation Corps. He was active in the McDonald Lions Club and held several offices.

Hallagin enjoyed the Tri-State Antique Engine and Thresher Association of Bird City and was well known for his expertise when monitoring the sod house. He shared the experiences of his brothers and sisters and the lifestyle the sod house created in the early years.


