Attorney argues Deweys habitually armed By Evelyn Ward today in history tempting to kill Roy Berry. This Sherman County Historical Society

July 15, 1903: Hearing on Dewey Habeas Corpus — Attorney General Coleman Makes Able Argument for the State — Hessin Hangs His Plea Upon the Peg That Berrys Were Desperate Characters - Coleman summarized his argument as follows: That the Dewey's habitually went armed; that they were apparently trying to establish a "little dukedom;" that the Deweys went to get the tank with a force of 11 men when two would have been sufficient; that the Dewey forces were concealed behind a sod wall and stayed there, fully armed, for half an hour; that as evidence of malice against the Berrys it was cited that Dewey had built a fence right through the Berry home and that Dewey had guarded a well to prevent the Berrys from getting water.

In reply to these arguments, Senator Hessin told of the threats which the Berrys had made against the Deweys in regard to taking away the tank which had been bought.

"I am willing to admit that a state of feud existed in that locality," said Mr. Hessin, "but I claim that it was the anti-Dewey forces which first armed themselves and came to the Dewey ranch and made demand on the Deweys. They wanted the Deweys to withdraw certain warrants legally issued for the arrest of the Berry boys. I will admit that there was certain to be a clash be-

tween the hostile factions sooner or later, but there was nothing to indicate when it would come. When it did come it was unexpected and unpremeditated."

July 16, 1903: Hoboes in Jail for Stealing — The prisoners are Allows Bail — Slayers of the charged with petit larceny. The Rock Island detective service was the complaining witness. July 17, 1903: Supreme Court Berrys MustAppear for Trial Under Bond of \$18,000 Each — Sheriff Approves Security and Prisoners Released Monday — The application for bail by Chauncey Dewey, Clyde Wilson and W.J. McBride was allowed by the supreme court Friday, July 10, and the bond of the prisoners is fixed at \$15,000 each, for the killing of the three Berrys

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makes \$18,000 for each of the prisoners, and a total sum of \$54,000.

The order of the supreme court is very brief and was merely entered in the clerk's docket without the formality of a prepared opinion. The record simply reads as follows: "Application for bail allowed. Bond of \$15,000 for each petitioner to be approved by the respondent. Costs of the special commissioner adjudged against the petitioners. Commissioner allowed \$75. Stenographer's fees allowed."
