Woman narrowly escaped death by lightning

Sherman County Historical Society July 26, 1903: Lightning's Queer Prank — Mrs. Gafford Miraculously Escapes Death — Bolt Strikes Milk Pails — One of the queerest pranks of lightning on record was that played by the bolt that struck the windmill of A.S. Gafford, who lives eight miles northeast of town.

The bolt followed the warm current of air coming from an open window, darted through, struck two telescoping milk pails setting on the floor, burned the clothing of Mrs. Gafford who was standing by, blistered her limbs below her knees, and then jumped to a dishpan on the stove, drilled a small hole through the bottom and made its exit through the floor, following a nail in the lumber.

July 28, 1903: Good News For Stockmen — The Dipping Order to be Modified — Governor Bailey Says That It Was Not the Intention to Treat Cattle That Were Not Infected — Many Complaints Made – "A number of cattlemen in the infected district," said the governor, "appear to think that this order will compel them to dip their cattle whether they are infected or not.

"It will be necessary for the cattle owners to prove that there is no diseased stock in their neighborhood before they can escape the order. The object of the order is to eradicate the disease, and the cattlemen

summer was hot and dry. And when harvest time came I ran out my reaper and cut a good crop of wheat on those very places where the hoppers the year before had eaten up everything, but the rest of the field amounted to little and I did not cut

"This put me to thinking. I noticed similar conditions with the same results in the neighborhood, and deduced the conclusion that good crops can be raised in this country if the land be given time to get back the moisture which the crop takes up, and that land burdened with a heavy crop every year becomes absolutely dead.

"It has no chance to conserve moisture and can not therefore produce vegetation. I have since proved this proposition beyond doubt, and with a single exception have never failed to raise an abundance of grain and large yields of corn. When the soil is left to invigorate itself and is summer fallowed, it will generally produce."
