The Goodland Star-News A 2001 Goodland High School graduate competed in a solar car race this month as a member of the Kansas State University Team.

His team started in the pole position and finished eighth out of 20 teams

Brad Larson, son of Kyle and Ellen Larson of Pretty Prairie, will be a junior this fall at the Kansas State engineering school, majoring in computer science. His mother said he does electrical work on the solar car.

College teams design and build the cars and then race them 2,300 miles from Chicago to Claremont, Calif., on historic Route 66. The article, "Solar Cars to Begin Gasoline-Free Journey Sunday" on the www.energy.gov/engine/ content.do web site, said the race, which began Sunday, July 13, and ended Wednesday, is considered the world's longest solar car race.

The article said the cars used photovoltaic solar cells to convert sunlight into electricity and store it in batteries for use when needed. Weather and energy management play important roles in the race, the article said.

The cars mostly travel at highway speeds and are required to obey local speed limits, but the sunnier the day, the farther and faster the cars can run. And bright days allow the cars to fill up their batteries for cloudy or rainy days.

The article said the Kansas State team, with its car CATalyst, had the best qualifying time and began in the pole position. Reports From the Road on the American Solar Challenge web site said the car completed 526 miles in the qualifier, significantly more than any other team.

that the lower interest rates meant a drop over last year and probably this year of nearly \$300,000. He said he did not see that changing much for at least a year or two, and that it was equal to a drop of 4 mills of property tax.

Using charts VonFeldt told the commissioners the city has done pretty well in maintaining expenses where possible. However, he did say the city needs to look at the utility rates because the sewer, water and electrical revenues are not covering the costs of operation.

Commissioner Chuck Lutters made a motion to accept the audit as presented, and a second motion to hire the same audit firm for the next three years at a cost of \$12,500 for 2003; \$13,000 for 2004; and \$13,600 for 2005.

Commissioner Dave Daniels asked about putting the audit out for bid. He was told that the last time the audit was bid VonFeldt, Bauer and VonFeldt were the low bidder by quite a percentage, and that the feeling of most of the commissioners was that they were doing a good job for the city at a reasonable price.
