Area student to explore medical field

Laran Steele of Weskan is enrolled in the National Youth Leadership Forum on Medicine in Houston and Galveston, Texas.

Railroad dispatch office was moved back to Goodland

Sherman County Historical Society August 1, 1903: Dispatchers Moved Back — The dispatchers of this division of the Rock Island railway were, by order of the general manager of the road who was here Friday, brought back from Colorado Springs to Goodland after an unsuccessful trial for a year at the former place.

The people of the town are glad to have the dispatchers' office here again and were in not in very good spirits when it was removed to Colorado Springs last August.

The new arrangement had to be abandoned at last and there need be no fears of the dispatchers' office ever being taken away again.

The dispatchers office has been fitted up again and the battery room newly equipped and more cells installed.

August 2, 1903: Robbed Laborer Of \$47 — Nels Nelson Relieved of Purse and Chases Thief, Who Escapes—Nels Nelson, a hard-working Swede, employed as a day laborer by the Rock Island here, was robbed of his pocketbook while today in history

thief, a colored man, was pursued but got away.

Nelson was awakened by a jerk at his pocket, and throwing his hand on the pocket where he kept his gone.

He sprung to his feet and chased the pick pocket, who was making for the box cars

August 3, 1903: Victory For The Trainmen — Rock Island Grants Increase in Wage Schedule of 15 Nels is not a foot racer, but the Per Cent. — It was understood that there was a possibility of a strike.

A strike would have brought on a serious condition indeed, but the crisis resulted in a victory for the employees.

ceive \$2.30 a hundred miles, excess mileage and overtime. Passenger conductors and brakemen receive stipulated salaries and their increase amounts to 12 per cent of the salary paid.

August 4, 1903: Two School Houses Sold — The sale of the school property of district No. 6 and district No. 45, which were disorganized by a special act of the state legislature and the territory added to district No. 1, was held.

The school house in district No. 6 sold well, the building being bought by John Chambers for \$222.50.

The school house in District No. 45 sold for \$125, but it is a much smaller building than the other. It was purchased by J.W. Klauer, acting for the school board of district No. 44.

The seats, desks, maps, etc. commanded a small figure and considerable of the material for use in the
