Liberal High team first in state caught violating equipment rule

The Liberal High School football team has been put on probation and it's coach, who once coached at Goodland High, banned from practice and one game for violating a rule against using school equipment at privately run summer camps.

The school is the first in the state to be caught violating the two-year-old rule. It prohibits member schools of the the Kansas State High School Activities Association from issuing equipment during the summer for an outside camp.

The association's executive board placed Liberal on one year of administrative probation after the

school itself reported two equipment violations. The Liberal team remains eligible for post season play.

The violations were committed by head coach Rich Anderson. The school reported that he used its equipment for a team camp in Liberal and at the University of Nebraska-Kearney in June.

The board suspended Anderson through Sept. 8. He is to have no contact with the team for practices or the first game of the season. Anderson, who was on vacation, didn't attend the hearing. He came to Liberal last season after a long

tenure in Pratt. He coached in Goodland before that, in the 1970s.

The board ruled that Liberal players must practice without pads for an additional four days during fall camp. Normally, teams have just three days without pads.

Finally, school administrators must report to the association's board on how the school dealt with the infractions. Administrators must identify the equipment used over the summer and make sure that it is still legal, or must recondition it and re-certify it.

"The burglary occurred when a person or persons entered the rear door by force at the No Pazzing Zone store at 377 N. Franklin Ave.," said Gary Shull, investigator with the Colby Police.

By Sunday, co-owner Chase Kough was removing signs from the storefront windows. He said he may not reopen since most of his inventory had been stolen.

Kough told police about half of the items taken were five-pound jugs containing one or two gallons of name brand items such as Opti-Pro, MET, Rx and Pro Complex.
