An analysis of the figures of wheat production in Kansas this year shows that the counties of the east central part of the state, which have for years been in the foremost rank of wheat counties are dropping behind in wheat lightning. production while the more western counties, especially those of northwest Kansas, are coming to the front as wheat counties.

The map of the wheat belt this year is considerably different from what it was in 1901.
