Business collected \$500 in eight days; man won clock

August 16, 1903: The eight day clock offered by Donly & Scott, the grocers, to anyone who should guess nearest the time when the clock would run down, provided each guess was accompanied by a 25 cent purchase ticket, was won by Henry Yantis.

His guess was 10:20 p.m. Aug. 11, and the clock, which was wound up at 8 o'clock a.m. Aug. 1, stopped at 10:29 p.m., Aug. 11. Two thousand tickets were sold, representing a business of \$500 in eight days. The prize is an ornamental standard movement, cathedral gong, eight day clock.

August 17, 1903: Kansas Towns on the Rock Island West of Belleville Make Complaint — The state board of railway commission-

ers have received petitions from 1,309 citizens of 21 towns between Belleville and Goodland asking the railway to establish a local passenger train service in that territory.

The petitions came as a result of the action of the Continental Creamery company to compel the Rock Island to carry milk and cream on the passenger trains.

The towns are: Gem, Athol, Esbon, Jennings, Colby, Agra, Smith Center, Allison, Formosa, Dresden, Selden, Stuttgart, Lamborn, Prairie View, Rexford, Ruleton, Brewster, Almena, Kensington, Linden and Levant. Lamborn and Ruleton are west of Goodland.

August 18, 1903: Assistant Attorney General Makes Settlement With Sherman County — H.L. Pestana was in Goodland in conference with the board of county commissioners looking toward the settlement of the seed grain account which has been allowed to drag along for a number of years. Settlement was made on the account without interest, the amount being \$2,457.10.

The county holds notes against the farmers who received the grain in 1895. Some of them have left the country, but in all possible cases an attempt will be made to collect on the notes and reimburse the county. By settling without going to law

Sherman county saved \$1,100 in interest.

August 19, 1903: James Bainbridge, for more than two years the proprietor of the Ingersoll Hotel, discontinued serving meals at noon Tuesday. The cause for closing down was the scarcity of help and the inability of Mrs. Bainbridge to oversee the work in the kitchen and dining room as she is experiencing a severe attack of hay fever.

Mr. Bainbridge will continue the lodging department of the hotel, which contains 16 rooms, and says that there is a possibility of starting

up the dining room again sometime in October or November. The Ingersoll Hotel has enjoyed a large patronage and at the time when the serving of meals was suspended had 45 boarders. Mr. Bainbridge is pleased with his class of boarders and regrets the inconvenience, but it could not be helped under the circumstances.
